



At a metro station in Washington on a January morning a man with a violin played for 1 hour. During that time many passed by. A man noticed that there was a musician playing, slowed, then hurried on. A short time later, the violinist received his first dollar from a woman who threw money in the violin case but continued walking. A young man leaned against the wall to listen then looked at his watch and walked on. A 3 year old boy stopped but his mother moved him along as he continued to look back. This was repeated often. As the musician continued people would briefly stop and listen. A few gave money. The man collected \$32. When he finished playing no one noticed.

The violinist was Joshua Bell, a world class violinist. He played Bach with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days before he sold-out a theatre where seats averaged over \$100. The social experiment organized by the Washington Post raises many questions but maybe the most important one is this: If we cannot stop and listen to a great musician, playing wonderful music, with a beautiful instrument... How many other things are we missing as we rush through life?"

Our Advent guide theme this year is "Capture The Moment" – Read it again for the very first time. We hear the Christmas songs and scriptures so often that the wonder can wear off. But what if we imagine that we are reading and hearing them for the very first time. What if we stop, listen and experience the wonder of what we are celebrating like first timers. Just maybe we could find our joy renewed. This is our prayer for you.





The Distraction of "Why?"

Verse Luke 1:5-8

What did I do to deserve this? Why is God allowing this to happen? What is God trying to teach me?

Questions like this are natural in times of struggle. The songbook of God's people includes them! (Ps. 13:1) But too often, the desire to know why can consume us. Searching for the unexplainable why can distract us from taking the next steps of faith. Attempting to explain why can hinder us from connecting with God in the present.

Zechariah & Elizabeth had a decades-long challenge trying to have a child. The why offered by their world blamed them for unconfessed sin. (Jn. 9:2) Luke introduces the story of Emmanuel by pointing out that the whys offered by the world – even our religious world – can be outright wrong. Zechariah & Elizabeth were righteous in God's eyes.

Thankfully, the why questions didn't distract Zechariah from doing his next right thing – serving in the Temple. And it didn't hinder him from connecting with God. In fact, by doing the next right thing, he would come face to face with a messenger from God that would change his life and world forever.

Prayer God, help me to come to you freely with all of the why questions. And help me to move through my questions into the next right thing for me during this Advent season. May I be ready and open to meet you and be changed by you.

Open to the Amazing

Verse Luke 5:9-20

Zechariah was a righteous man serving God. Of all people who should be prepared for God to do something amazing, it should be him! But this holy man doing holy work in the holiest place he would ever go is entirely unprepared for what happens.

I'm not criticizing! I tend to affirm the adage, "When something seems too good to be true, it probably is." To me, Zechariah's question to Gabriel feels obvious. But maybe that says more about me than anything else.

Am I open to God doing amazing things? I should be, but there's a lot of "How can I be sure?" in me. I've seen God do amazing things. God does amazing things all the time, but I still find myself asking, "How can I be sure?"

I love Gabriel's response to Zechariah's question. Here's my paraphrase: "Zechariah, you're full of questions. How about you just shut up and watch what God does?"

There is a lesson here. When God shows up, we're better off being quiet and joining in with the amazing things God is up to. If things are truly from God, many of our questions will get answered without us ever asking them!

Prayer Amazing God. I'm so glad you're not afraid of my questions or doubts. But when you show up, please help me learn to be quiet and remain open to the amazing things you want to do in my life!

The Gift of Waiting

Verse Luke 5:21-25

I emailed someone yesterday. They haven't replied! I texted someone an hour ago. I haven't heard back!! I sent a Snapchat a few minutes ago. No response!!! What's wrong with people?!

I only half jest. This is often how we react. We live in an instant society.

God doesn't work that way. Biblical wisdom describes maturity as a seed growing into a deeply rooted tree. Paul describes the world waiting for God's rescue with pregnancy language – a metaphor that Zechariah and Elizabeth were now living through. Healthy growth takes time.

After decades of waiting, Elizabeth had nine more months of waiting before she could hold this gift of God's grace. Her response? She celebrated God's kindness. She embraced the waiting. We tend to view waiting as a nuisance. (Or time to be on our phones.) But Zechariah and Elizabeth, after waiting for decades, received this waiting as more time to grow – this time alongside baby John.

Advent is a season of waiting. It may be the hardest part, but when we push past waiting we miss out on how God wants us to grow during this time. Let's join Elizabeth in receiving this season of waiting as God's kindness to us – waiting for the birth of something beautiful.

Prayer Lord God, please help me receive this season of waiting as kindness from you. In my waiting, shape me. Help me grow so I am better equipped to receive and celebrate the gift of Emmanuel.

Verse Luke 1:29-30 (The Message)

"She was thoroughly shaken, wondering what was behind a greeting like that. But the angel assured her, 'Mary, you have nothing to fear.'"

I can certainly relate to Mary being "thoroughly shaken", "greatly troubled" (NIV), "confused and disturbed" (NLT) by having an angel come calling. I think that would have been my reaction, too.

I can also relate to her questioning the plausibility of becoming pregnant and giving birth to a baby since she had never slept with a man. (v. 34 - But how? I've never slept with a man).

This unexpected message and extraordinary assignment from God certainly put a wrench in Mary's plans. I think of how often I am paralyzed, filled with dread when my plans have to change, or when there is uncertainty in my future. It's hard for me to give up control, to let life unfold, to trust that God will work all things together for the good. So, the part of this story that challenges me the most is Mary's posture of openness to the possibility - when she says, "Let it be with me just as you say." It challenges me to reflect on how many of God's invitations I might be missing out on.

What about you? Are you open to the assignments that God invites you to accept?

Prayer Lord, help us to trust you and to be open to the unique assignments you may have for us.

Verse Luke 1:26-28


"In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. I wonder what Mary was doing when the angel 'went to her'. The text doesn't say. Mary doesn't seem to be doing anything special - she isn't praying or worshipping or engaging in anything that we might qualify as 'spiritual'. She was just going about her regular, ordinary life in a nondescript little town called Nazareth. It was a place that had no special religious significance like Jerusalem or Bethlehem did.

Yet, it's in this very ordinary setting that the angel declares to Mary, "The Lord is with you". It's this very ordinary context that God uses to deliver the most extraordinary message. God turns this very ordinary moment into something most holy.

How often do we get preoccupied at Christmas, striving to create the perfect ambiance for something special and spiritual to happen, forgetting that God is always "with us" – and it's his presence that makes the ordinary moments holy.

Prayer God, this Christmas, will you help us to stop our striving for perfection. Help us to appreciate the holiness of every ordinary moment – because you are with us.




Capture the Moment SATURDAY DECEMBER 9TH

Verse Luke 1:39-56

"... the baby in my womb leaped for joy." Luke 1:44 (NIV)

A Surprising Message

Verse Matthew 18:18-24

When we read the Christmas story, it's easy to gloss over the strangeness of Joseph's situation.

He's pledged to be married to woman who, it turns out, is pregnant with a child that isn't his. He's about to divorce her (quietly, refusing to shame her publicly), when he's visited in a dream by a divine messenger and told to go through with the wedding and raise the child (who happens to be God-incarnate!) as his own. So, Joseph has a choice make: divorce Mary, as he would have been expected to do, or trust the messenger—even though the whole thing seems nuts—and go through with the wedding. In the end, Joseph's faithfulness wins out.

The message of Christmas is a surprising one. Are we really expected to believe that the creator of the universe came to earth as a human baby in a backwater town in rural Palestine? Like Joseph, we too have a choice to make. Will we be open to the surprise of the incarnation, even when it forces us to rethink our assumptions about how the world works? Or will we let what we think we know about the world blind us to God's work within it.

Prayer Dear God, may we be open to the surprising message of the incarnation—that You took on human flesh and walked among us—and may we be obedient to the call to follow You, even when it may seem foolish. Amen.

Verse Luke 2:1-7

"(She) laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."


Verse Luke 2:1-7

Prayer Father, restore the centrality of Jesus in our lives so that in this season, and all seasons, we can worship our King and our Saviour.




Capture the Moment SATURDAY DECEMBER 16TH

I'm seeing this familiar passage with new eyes this Advent season. These past few months have been filled with unexpected pain, laments of sorrow for family and friends and a deep longing for a better world. In this passage I am seeing a longing that I have never noticed before.

The Magi likely heard about the prophecy of a King of the Jews whose birth would be marked by a special star in the sky. As they watched the night sky and saw the star, I imagine their hearts were filled with excitement at meeting this new King. As they journeyed over what would have been weeks or months, this anticipation would have built, like a child's anticipation leading up to Christmas day. Searching for someone great, longing for something more.

I too have been longing for a better world, waiting for the return of the King of Kings. Knowing that this isn't the way it was created to be. I find a certain affinity with the Magi today, knowing that there is something great just over the horizon, journeying towards the long-awaited King.

Prayer God as we journey through this season, we carry with us the joys and sorrows of the past, and we long with anticipation for the future, in which all is made new. We look ahead to the day when the King is revealed for all weary travellers to worship.




Verse Matthew 2:1-12

Today, we draw our attention to who the Magi were looking for. First, they asked Herod the foreign King, "where is the King of the Jews?". Unknowingly slighting him and his tenuous rule over Judea. Next, Herod asks his Jewish advisors where the Messiah would be born, he obviously knows the Israelite prophecies about a Saviour who would rescue them. Then we read the prophecy in verse 6, stating that a Ruler of Israel would come, who would also be a Shepherd of the people.

King. Messiah. Ruler. Shepherd. Four different descriptions for the child who was born, under that star many years ago. Prayer We come before you, longing for the coming Saviour. Until then we trust in your plan, your path, your love.






Jesus Presented at the Temple

Verse Luke 2:21-40

"On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived."

Even after the extraordinary events Mary and Joseph experienced, from the immaculate conception to their baby's birth, they were still just Mary and Joseph from Nazareth on the journey of first- time parenthood.

After their baby was born, and the shepherds told of their wild experience of angels proclaiming the Saviour was born, life continued on. Even though their baby was the son of God, they had to learn how to be first time parents within their culture at that time. This required them to bring their newborn son to be circumcised and named on the 8th day. This was the custom. It's what Jewish parents did, and yet, in the midst of this ordinary act we are reminded that this baby is no ordinary baby.

There are many customs for naming a Jewish baby, but these were not followed by Mary and Joseph because they had been given a name by an angel before he was conceived. This is just one of many seemingly ordinary experiences for Mary and Joseph that collide with the supernatural. Which, I suppose, should be expected when you're raising the son of God.

Prayer Lord, help us to see where the supernatural collides with the ordinary in our lives today.

Simeon's Encounter

Verse Luke 2:22-32

"On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived."

Again, we see Mary and Joseph living a normal, everyday Jewish life as they prepare for the purification rites. Jesus was almost 6 weeks old when they headed to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord and offer the required sacrifice.

As they make their way to Jerusalem the Holy Spirit is at work preparing another supernatural encounter. We don't know when, but we do know a man called Simeon was told he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. On this very day, I suspect as Mary and Joseph made their way to Jerusalem, Simeon was moved by the Holy Spirit to go to the temple courts, and when they arrived Simeon took Jesus into his arms Praising God.

Reading this scripture, we see how God has orchestrated this encounter, and had been planning this moment since before Jesus was born. Not only had Simeon been told by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before seeing the Lord's Messiah, but he was also moved by the Holy Spirit to go to the temple on this day. This is a beautiful depiction of how God is always at work, orchestrating divine encounters which can take many years to come to fruition.

Verse Luke 2:33-40

Here the story continues with Mary and Joseph at the temple not because the Holy Spirit called them there, but because they were following the law. They were doing what they knew was required of them and God met them there, in their obedience, in an extraordinary way.

Today's scripture begins with Simeon's blessing and then prophet Anna coming at the very moment Simeon finished speaking to again confirm that Jesus was someone special indeed. I love that verse 33 says that Mary and Joseph, "Marveled at what was said about Jesus." They'd both met with angels, experienced an immaculate conception first hand, had multiple confirmations about their incredible child and yet they can still marvel at what God is doing in their midst.

The passage ends with Mary, Joseph and Jesus obediently completing the purification rights and then heading back to their hometown of Nazareth.

These parents, raising the son of God live their lives in this beautiful tension between the ordinary and extraordinary. Their normal everyday lives are punctuated by supernatural encounters, divine interventions and miracles.

The most incredible part of all of this is that we get to live in this same tension. God is still at work in our ordinary lives today.

Prayer Lord, help us see where you are working in our lives and let us marvel at the great things you are doing. Help us obediently follow you when our lives feel both ordinary and extraordinary.
