This "holy week" we will be taking a look each day at a section of the creed and reflecting on its meaning for our lives. We invite you to journey along. It would be best to read the entire creed over each day and perhaps you might want to even memorize it. Each day we have provided a section of the Creed to focus on, a scripture, a short devotional thought, and a prayer.

Reflect

Today's section of the Apostles' Creed is a strong, clear and enduring foundation for the Christian Church. We believe in the Father, who is a creator, and is almighty. Jesus At The Centre Of It All

Read Luke 1:26-38

"I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary."

Reflect

There is a beautiful dichotomy in the way that Jesus came, and in the ways that he continues to be present in the midst of our everyday lives. What a profoundly moving idea it is to state in one sentence that Jesus is the Son of God, and yet also that he would enter into the world in the humble miracle of birth.

This picture of who Jesus is, and how he is with us, makes space for an intersection between the regular and the sacred, and that intersection changes everything. Because of Jesus there is no longer any separation between the sometimes mundane or even overwhelming pieces of our everyday lives, and the rich, abundant presence of the Son of the Most High. He is with us in the very middle of the places that are hard and heavy, as well as in the moments of joy and delight. He is present with us, the Saviour of the World.

Mary gives a beautiful example of one who says yes to the presence and purposes of God. Even when she was afraid, when she still had questions, she chose to partner with the work of the Spirit, and live in the beautiful in-between of the sacred and the ordinary: the place where we meet Jesus.

Lord, we want to say yes again to your presence in the middle of our everyday lives. Come and show us the way again we pray. Amen.

What Happened On Good Friday?

Read Isaiah 53:1-6

"He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to hell."

Reflect

On the surface, there is nothing good about Good Friday. Jesus is suffering. There's nothing good about that. But there's more here than what's on the surface. From today's passage, I'm taken by the words "and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all." They help us understand what happened on Good Friday.

Let's do something tactile. Grab any book. Lay your right hand flat. That represents you. Set the book on that hand. It represents sin. If God is skyward, that book is a barrier between you and God. That's what sin has done. It has separated us from God. Now take your left hand. It represents Jesus. Place it on top of the book. Rotate your hands so your right hand is now on top. While you do this echo Isaiah's words, "he took up our pain and bore our suffering... the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all." Now separate your hands, with the book now in your left hand. Look at your right hand. Do you see where this leaves you? The barrier between you and God has been removed. That's what happened on Good Friday. And that is good news!

Pray

God, thank you for what was accomplished on Good Friday. Thank you for suffering and removing the barrier that sin had created. May I walk in the freedom that the cross brings. Amen.

Why Is The Resurrection Such A Big Deal?

Read | Corinthians 15:1-8

"The third day he rose again from the dead."

Reflect

The Apostles' Creed identifies the pillars upon which Christianity stands, especially when it says, "The third day he rose from the dead." The importance of this idea for the Christian faith cannot be overstated.

Upon his death, Jesus could appear as yet another martyr. But the difference between a martyr and a Savior is a single idea, the resurrection. The resurrection is a game changer. Yes, this is the one time that cliché is appropriate. Whatever transaction happened on the cross is impossible for us to fully know, but the resurrection that followed three days later transforms the rest of history. It is a hinge moment because everything that happened before this moment would be another entry in the records of martyrdom if not for the resurrection. Instead, the resurrection means that never again will there be any doubt that Jesus was whom he claimed to be. Never again will we wonder if death has been defeated. Never again will we fear death's sting because Jesus has triumphed and ascended to the Father.

Christianity is the empty tomb religion. It's true, but more importantly, as Paul says in Ephesians 1:19-20, the same power that raised Jesus from the dead is available to you.

Reflect

There is a lyric on Lauren Daigle's new album. It rings true for me: "To know me, you would have to know my friend" ('To Know Me'). Lauren is simply telling us, through song, that if we really want to know her well, we have to know her friend. I relate to this and I think it helps us understand the Holy Spirit.

The only way we can fully know and appreciate Jesus is if we become well acquainted with his Spirit, or in the words of the Creed, "believe in the Holy Spirit".

John 14 describes who the Spirit is and what the Spirit does. The Holy Spirit... is an advocate, a helper, the presence of authentic truth, lives with you and is in you, enables you to see and know Jesus, follow Jesus, and then be Jesus to others. If we cooperate, the Spirit will work in us and through us.

How are your relationship and reliance on God's spirit? When you read this line in the Creed, how personal is it to you?

Forgive me if I ever thought I could do this Jesus life without you. Today, I invite you to be close to me, to be truth to me, to be teacher to me, and to be peace to me. Why Not Just Go It Alone?

Read | Corinthians 12:12-26

"I believe in the holy Christian church, the communion of saints"

Reflect

Many parts of the Bible are hard to understand. We study and ask ourselves how these stories and instructions from the ancient world speak to our lives in the 21st century. However, 1 Corinthians 12 feels like Paul is writing directly into our modern world. Perhaps this is because he is addressing a fundamental part of the human condition. We struggle with both an unhealthy independence ("I don't need you") and an insecure identity ("You don't need me").

Paul reminds us that these paradigms are untrue. We are all needed and we all need each other. That is how God made us. We were created for connection and interdependence. God's rescue plan for the world involves a restored relationship with Him. It also involves healed relationships with each other. It is profoundly important that Jesus said that people would know we are his disciples, not by how much we love Him, but by how much we love each other. (John 13:35)

Jesus said that the greatest commandments are to love God with everything and to love everyone. When we do, we are living into God's restoration plan for the whole world. A plan to restore shalom among all people, the state he'd always intended.

Reflect

I'll never forget that day in my early twenties when I prayed to ask Jesus into my heart. Everlasting Life

Read John 3:1-17

Reflect

This passage of scripture tells us some very basic but key things about the Kingdom of God. First, the kingdom of God is a spiritual kingdom. It can only be understood once you have been born of the Spirit of God. Second, the key to gaining entrance into this kingdom is a changed heart. However you came to the Lord, whether gradually or through some profound experience, the main thing that matters is your attitude towards Jesus and who you believe Him to be. And third, everyone starts out at the same point - lost and in need of a saviour. This third point goes directly against a culture that largely believes that people are basically good and just in need of some minor moral direction.


Nicodemus was a fine religious person - maybe even a bit of a celebrity in his day, but that wasn't going to get him into the Kingdom. After his conversation with Jesus that night, I believe we see a new understanding in Nicodemus of the Kingdom of God beyond the grave and a changed heart as he appears again to help care for Jesus' body after the crucifixion.
